






Letter from the Director



The Cincinnati Fire Museum highlights the significant contributions that Cincinnati has made to the firefighting profession. Cincinnati is the birthplace of the first paid, professional fire department and we are proud to display its history.

Our Historic Collection



Over 700 Artifacts

The Cincinnati Fire Museum's Collection is comprised of over 700 items plus a sizeable archive of photos, documents, and records. It represents the firefighting history of Cincinnati from the very first volunteer fire company formed in 1808. The fire alarm drum and brass key to the first fire house in 1808, along with parade hats, impressive hand pumped engines, and wooden water pipes have been displayed to illustrate the exciting bucket brigade years of the Cincinnati Fire Volunteers.



A Unique National Attraction



In 1917, Cincinnati became one of the nation's first fully-motorized fire companies, and the Ahrens-Fox Company of Cincinnati emerged as a leading builder of fire equipment. Two full-size Ahrens-Fox Engines in all their glory, are featured along with many other pieces of equipment. The outstanding collection of artifacts and graphics are the nucleus of the Cincinnati Fire Museum, making it a unique and prominent national attraction.

Next Steps



2025 Goals

- Organize an intern program to create a database to record each artifact in the collection in which every entry has a photo and description
- Evaluate current exhibits to explore how they can be improved and/or better preserved
- Physically sort archived items into categories such as firefighting gear (e.g., helmets, hoses, extinguishers), uniforms and badges, vintage models, and historical records such as logbooks and call reports

Emergency Preparedness

In a fire, every second counts. Fire safety education helps people know exactly what to do—like how to stop, drop, and roll, use a fire extinguisher, or safely evacuate a building.

In 2024, the U.S. Fire Administration reported a staggering 92 home fire fatalities, with victims as young as one year of age.



To honor the 343 members of the New York City Fire Department (FDNY) who lost their lives on September 11, 2001, the Cincinnati Fire Museum, in partnership with the Cincinnati Fire Department, held a solemn ceremony to formally retire badge number 343. The museum's piece of World Trade Center steel served as a poignant backdrop for this significant tribute.



Santa Rescue

This popular holiday tradition once again drew a large crowd, with community members gathering outside the museum to watch as Santa was rescued from the Fire Museum roof by a Cincinnati Fire Department ladder truck. The outdoor rescue, held at noon, was free and open to the public. Guests who chose to continue the festivities inside—enjoying hot chocolate, snacks, and a chance to visit with Santa—were welcomed with standard museum admission.























Fundraising


2024 CFM Firefighter Cook-Off & Fundraiser

attendees, the event raised an impressive \$20.512 in support of the museum.










Financial Year in Review


